2.	Unsustainable economic practices have driven environmental degradation and climate change. Industrialized countries may grow quickly, but they threaten long-term environmental stability. Principles of climate justice, like historical responsibility and equal shares, guide fair strategies for a sustainable transition. Identify the 'historical responsibility' and 'equal shares' principles of climate justice.
